Long after their high school and college diplomas are framed, our graduates are still benefiting from the lessons they learned here on the banks of the Rappahannock River.

They're lessons about timeless values, like integrity. Positive character attributes, like self-motivation. Selfless habits, like service.

And because St. Margaret's is a boarding school, students don't just learn these lessons in the classroom, they also practice them in the dormitories and see them modeled by resident faculty 24 hours a day.

In 2001, St. Margaret's engaged a professional planner and more than 100 parents, alumnae, faculty, staff and friends in developing a comprehensive campus master plan. The plan provides a blueprint for ensuring that the school's facilities will accommodate our current and projected programs, support our future aspirations, and help us remain attractive to the best prospective students and faculty.

The campus master plan also affirms our mission as a strong, small school anchored by a vibrant residential community. In the summer of 2002, we took the first step recommended by the plan and renovated our largest dormitory, Latané Hall.

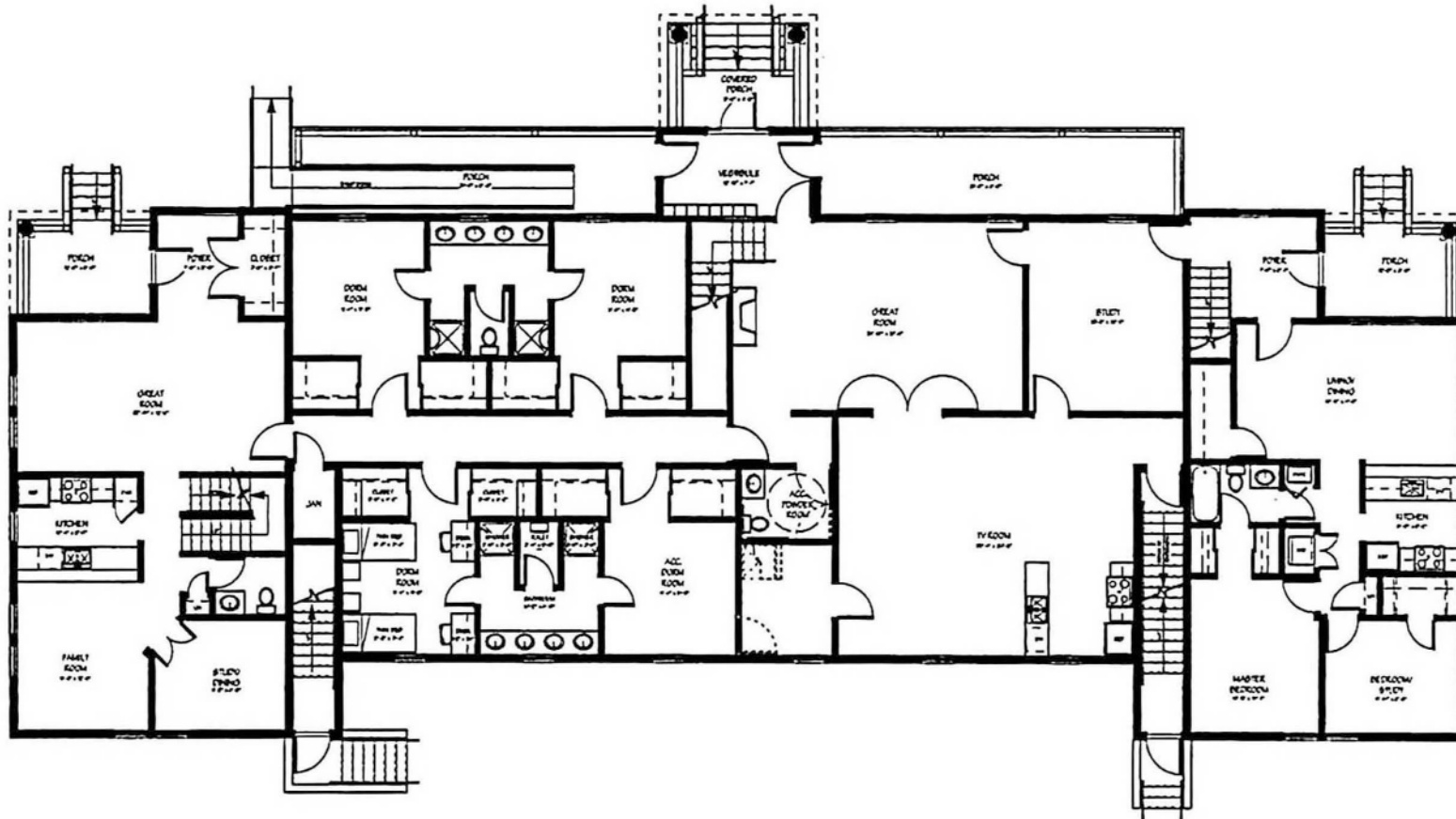


Our vision is a campus whose very design surrounds students with opportunities for developing positive values, practicing healthy habits, and strengthening character.

Thanks to the largest gift in school history, a \$750,000 challenge from parents Patrick and Jill McCuan, and matching gifts from other parents, alumnae and friends, we're building a 24-student dormitory at the north end of campus. McCuan House is under construction and on schedule to open for the 2005-2006 academic year.

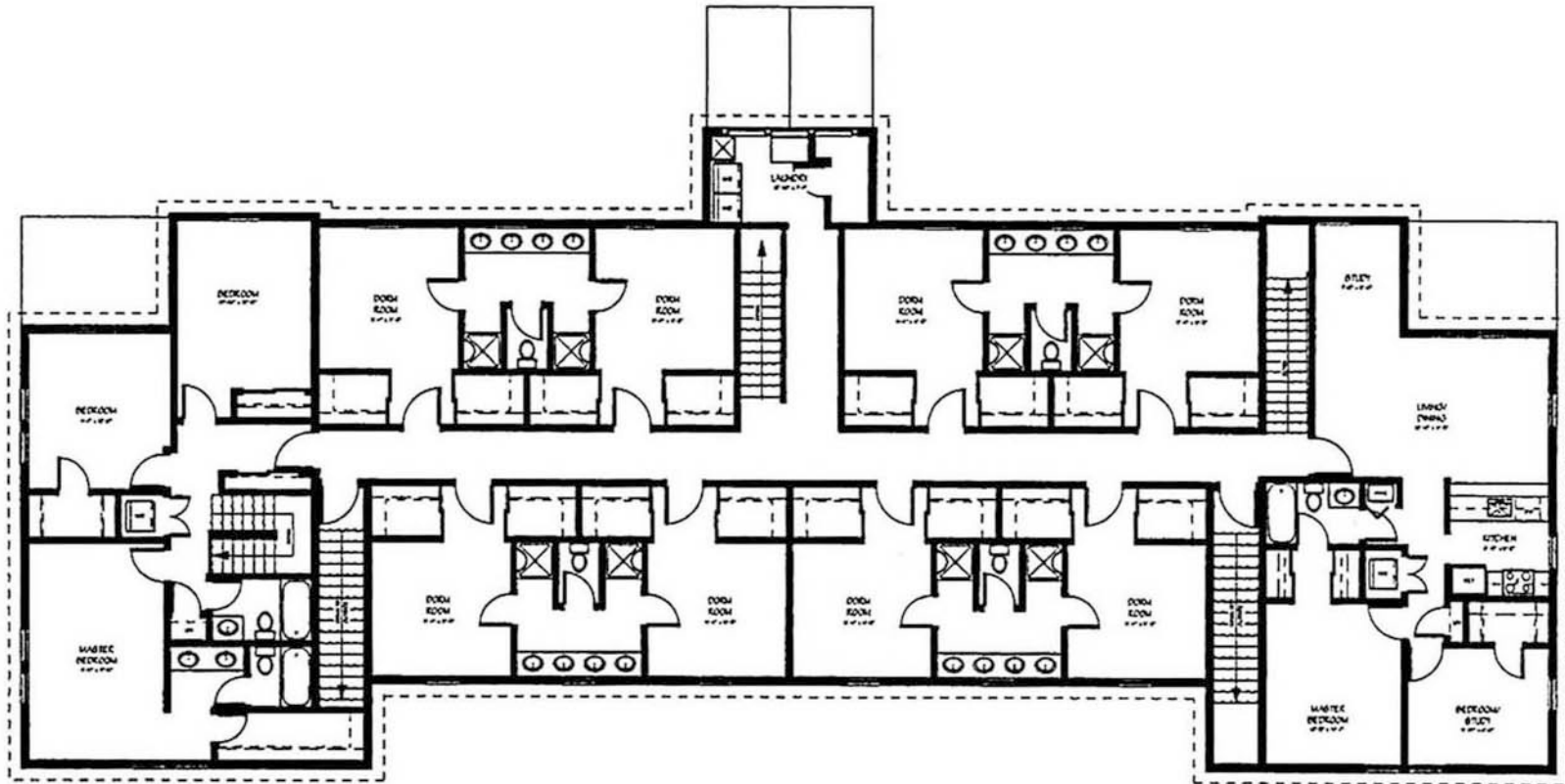


First Floor Plan

Our next goals are to fund an endowment that will ensure the continued maintenance of McCuan House and our other facilities, and to make long-overdue renovations to the Pettigrew Hall faculty apartments.
